What is the date? 12 sep 2013. What is 12 sep 2013? It's the date. semi-colon: clauses share syntactic element (the Subject is shared)



Suppose you are speaking about Smalltalk to some group accustomed to curly-bracket syntax. How do you avoid someone complaining that "Smalltalk's syntax is really weird!"

Statement = Receiver Message Argument

full stop / period: ends statements colon: separates keyword and value

date='12 sep 2013'. '12 sep 2013'=date.

semi-colon: clauses share syntactic element (the Receiver is shared)
